Floating Bog Permit available to members

Lake Shamineau Association members are able to utilize the Association's DNR 2026 Bog Mitigation Permit to remove floating cattail bogs less than 6 x 6 feet in size and relocate larger bogs by reattaching them and securing them to land. Non-members would need to apply for their own permit from the DNR.

Authorized Control Area:

Migrating floating bog(s) on Shamineau (49012700).

Migrating free-floating cattail bogs within Shamineau Lake may be removed if they are < or = to approx. 6X6 feet in size and larger migrating free-floating bogs may be moved and reattached in the SE bay area adjacent to state land or the NW bay area as long as they are not reattached in an area adjacent to private property and blocking their access to the lake. Work is to be done by association members only as they occur during the 2024 open water season.

Authorized Action:

Relocating and/or removing of migrating floating bogs.

Relocated migrating bogs must be secured to prevent further movement using wooden stakes. This permit authorizes the transport of aquatic plants and prohibited invasive species during bog relocation or removal activities.

Before transporting the bog for disposal you must: (1) drain excess water from the bog material before leaving the water body, for example by parking the truck on an incline; (2) transport the bog material directly from the water body to the disposal site; (3) dispose of bog material at least 300 feet from any waters of the state or seasonally flooded lands; and (4) clean all aquatic plants, sediment and prohibited invasive species from all equipment with each load – no vegetation should be on the outside of the transport truck/trailer before using public roads. If you intend to remove the floating bog via a public access, make sure you contact the owner of the access (an access permit may be necessary).

The use of any heavy equipment (e.g. backhoe or bobcat) is not allowed to remove floating cattail bog under this permit and no removal of the lake bottom is allowed under this permit. DNR APM staff in Little Falls (320-232-1079) must be notified before large bogs greater than 50X50' in size are moved. Bogs must be inspected by permit holder prior to removal for presence of loon nests.



Keep it Clean MN

The Lake Shamineau Lake Improvement District has joined this organization. The Keep It Clean campaign addresses the growing problem of garbage and waste left on the ice by anglers, campers and recreationists through education, legislation and enforcement. The Keep It Clean bill was signed into law in May 2023, making it illegal to place garbage and waste on or under the ice on Minnesota's lakes and rivers. They have 80 members representing thousands of lakes and rivers.

Lake Shamineau Association Spring Membership Meeting

May 24, 2025, 9:00 am at Lincoln Evangelical Church

Welcome: President Dale Williams welcomed members. The board members introduced themselves.

Secretary's Report: Minutes of the previous spring membership meeting was printed in the spring newsletter and copies were available on the tables. A motion to approve the minutes as printed was made, seconded, and approved.

Treasurer's Report: Current balances as of April 22, 2025 included the savings balance of \$892.47, checking balance of \$7,300.78 and an interest earning certificate of deposit of \$20,000, for a total of \$29,060.11 A motion to approve the treasurer's report was made, seconded and approved.

Membership Report: Kim thanked the co-captains who visit properties and help to get new or renewal memberships. Active member numbers enable us to lobby for our lake with the township, county and state. Memberships are important.

Water Quality: Bob Ingle updated the members regarding Lake Shamineau Lake Improvement District (LSLID) activities:

Ambassadors have been hired for coverage at both landings. The Ambassadors will be working weekends and holidays until Labor Day weekend. The Lake Shamineau Lake Improvement District (LSLID) has received notice of a the Morrison County AIS Grant was approved for 2025 in the amount of \$12,722 that included: \$4,470 for Vegetation Surveys, \$2,500 for AIS remediation which is used for chemical treatments and scuba divers, \$252 for updating signage, \$500 for Zebra Mussel Settling Plates, and \$5,000 for the Ambassador program.

During 2025, the LID will continue their successful program for control of Aquatic Invasive Species including a targeted survey of the lake to determine areas for treatment, use of herbicide treatments as required, and the use of scuba divers for hand pulling.

Settling Plates – Settling plates were demonstrated and will be deployed around the lake to monitor zebra mussel infestations. The LID Board members purchased the materials using the Morrison County Grant funds and put together the plates for deployment. Currently there are 7 volunteers that will assist with the monitoring of the settling plates to allow for quick detection of zebra mussels.

Landing Light – Bob Ingle reported that a solar-powered motion detection light has been installed at the west landing. The purchase of the light was funded by the DNR. The lighting will assist boaters with the cleaning of boats for AIS as they exit the lake in the evening hours.

Board Elections: Board members reaching the end of their current term include Dale Williams, Kim Salisbury, Ty Peterson, and Rick Fagereng who each agreed to continue serving. A motion was made to elect the four volunteers. The motion was seconded and approved.

New Business: Eric Altena, Area Fisheries Manager, MN DNR lake plan for fish management on Lake Shamineau gave a presentation on Lake Shamineau's fish surveys. The Powerpoint slides are posted on the LSA website under Fishing. See the report on the [LSA website](#) fishing page or [click here](#)

Sandy reported that the tree seedling purchase for the Association did not happen, but the Morrison County tree seedling purchase program information was emailed to members who have provided an email to us for private purchases.

Other: Thanks to volunteers who cleaned up the ditches on roads around Lake Shamineau on May 4, 2025.

Door prizes were awarded to members present whose names were drawn. Many door prizes were donated from local businesses. Be sure to thank them and mention the lake association appreciates their support.

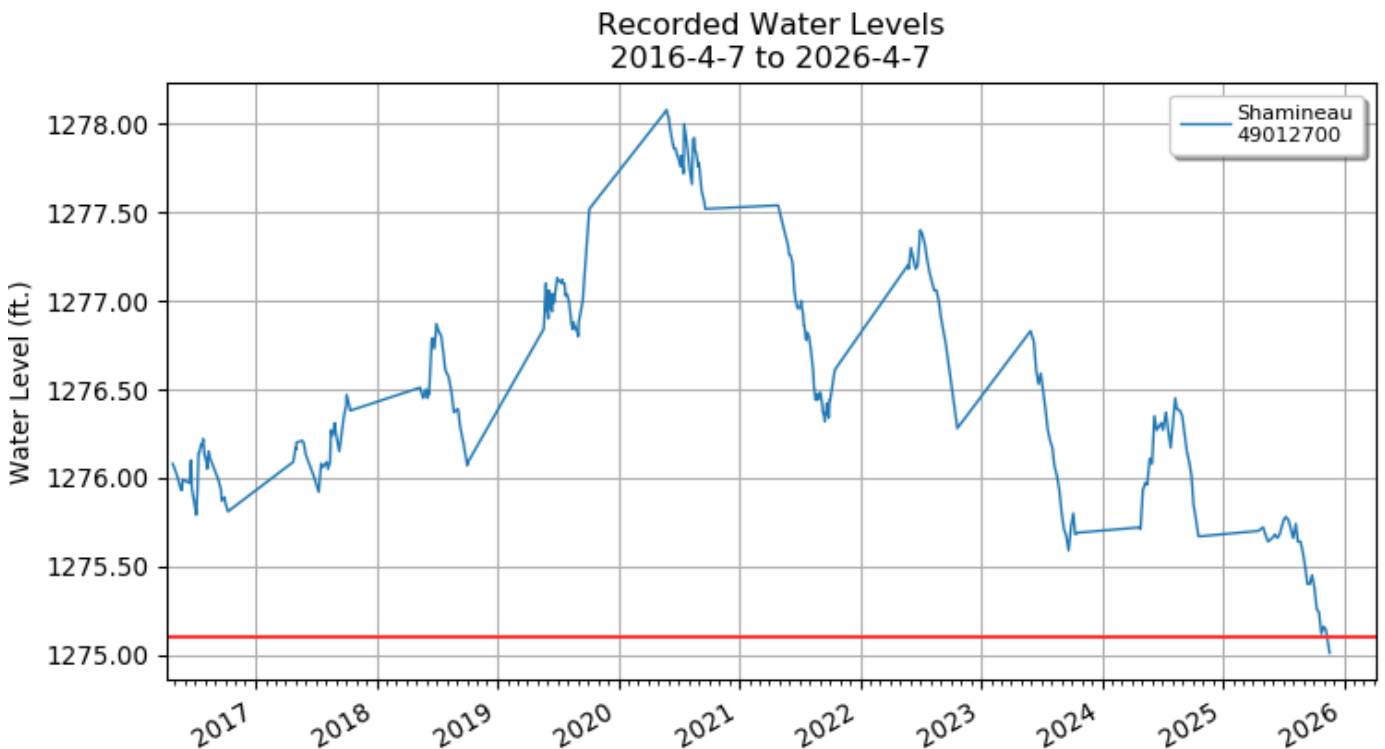
The Lions Club at Scandia Valley are considering a township wide cleanup to include the lakes. LSA will participate rather than sponsoring our own as we've done recently.

At the start of session Minnesota Lakes and Rivers was asked by jet ski advocates if we would support legislation lowering the hours of operation for jet skis from the current time of 9:30am to 8:00am. We attend over sixty lake association meetings across the state each year. We agreed to poll a sampling of our members, and sent a survey to about 2000 of you. An astonishing 33% responded.

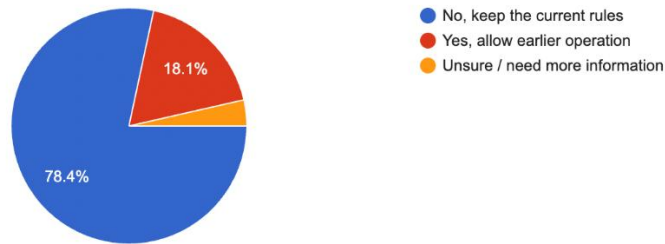
The results were clear - Minnesotan's do not support expanding the hours of operation for jet skis.

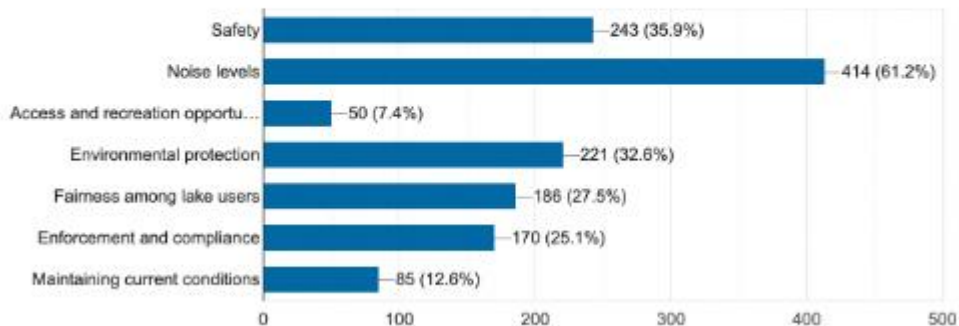
In addition to the survey, we received dozens of emails on the issue. People were terribly concerned about the impact of jet skis on wildlife. A few commented that they had witnessed jet ski users chasing loons or seagulls with their PWC, running at high speed through narrows or crowded boating lanes, or through aquatic vegetation. We also received a few comments from rowing sports lovers saying that they liked having quieter mornings when they could row or paddle without the impact of motorized water sports.

Despite the improvements in PWC design, noise remains the primary area of concern among stakeholders.

Wake boats are both fun and problematic - Lake Associations can navigate both

Many lake associations are contending with a new issue on their lakes - wake surfing.

Wake surfing is the fastest growing segment of the boating industry. Boat builders are designing boat hulls that “plow” the water and use ballast tanks and hydroplanes to drive the stern of boats down into the water. The result is wakes that have the size and energy of Malibu curlers.

It is easy to see why this new sport is so popular. Wake surfing is easy to learn and can be done by multiple generations, making for a great family day on the lake. But the wakes created by these new boats are very, very different from a ski, pontoon, or typical runabout. Because of that energy these wakes have a much greater impact on shoreline, eroding banks and damaging docks, lifts and boats if the wakes hit at full strength.

Prop thrust washes at least twenty feet deep, and can disturb lake sediments, uproot native vegetation, and silt over spawning beds.

These large, powerful wakes can make fishing impossible, capsize or swamp canoes, kayaks, paddle boards, rowing skulls and even pontoon boats. Injuries have occurred when other boaters unexpectedly hit a large wake surfing wake.

Simply put, there are problems.

Lake associations are struggling to find a good response. Many of us have spent years trying to bring lake associations together, increase membership, build capacity. Efforts to curb wake surfing, even through local ordinance, threaten to undo this work. Many wake surfing enthusiasts also belong to lake associations. Many have strong community relationships and even discussion of local ordinances to limit wake surfing can drive divisions, particularly in this hypersensitive political climate.

In fact, there is only one lake in Minnesota that has successfully passed an ordinance regulating wakesurfing, Caribou Lake in Cook County. Caribou is in the far north, at the end of the road and no one on the lake owned a wake surfing watercraft when they advanced the ordinance. But this does not mean that we must give up any hope of achieving a solution where the negative impacts are successfully mitigated. It is possible to find a solution that builds political capital, brings the community together in an effort to protect the resource and mitigates controversy.

Minnesota Lakes and Rivers, MLR has followed a three-step process:

- ▶ Supporting science at the Saint Anthony Falls Lab to determine the wake and prop thrust dynamics and define the specific ecological impacts,
- ▶ Use this science to draft Best Practices on wake and prop thrust management
- ▶ Educate all boaters on these Best Practices through a boater education and certification program

As more and more boaters take this course, learn the potential impacts of wake surfing and the Best Practices they can use to minimize these impacts, they will be more and more open to compromise and less susceptible to misinformation

As more and more boaters take this course, learn the potential impacts of wake surfing and the Best Practices they can use to minimize these impacts, they will be more and more open to compromise and less susceptible to misinformation. In addition, MLR, has joined with one of our members to offer high quality maps showing areas of the lake that are at least 500 feet from shore and more than 20 feet deep. MLR is also working to raise funding from our lake association partners to put up billboards that further emphasize this message and build on the social pressure to use Best Practices when wake surfing.



This education and signage at the landing will reinforce the Best Practices message in the training and create social pressure to do the right thing. Using our large network of partners, MLR is working to create a climate where wake surfing can be done without impairing the resource upon which it depends.
